#### PROGRAM INFORMATION

MCCDA is a state and federally funded head start preschool program in operation since 1966. MCCDA's purpose has always been to recruit children and their families who are at significant risk of concern later in school and in life. Our intentions are to ensure these children go to school ready to learn and have a high likelihood of success in life and school. The Board of Directors and staff are committed to helping low-income preschool aged children, their families, and communities overcome the effects of poverty. Our center-based model provides each child with an age-appropriate learning environment led by qualified preschool teachers. The centers expose children to varied experiences which stimulate each child's social, intellectual, physical, and emotional growth and development. In addition to providing educational services to children and their families, MCCDA Head Start Preschool strives to strengthen families and the community they reside within by providing or linking families to local resources. These include resources for health, dental and nutritional services, social services, mental health services, services for children with disabilities, and opportunities for parent governance and involvement.

During the 2023-24 program year we served 179 children and their families. The children attended school 5 days a week from 8am to 3pm in a classroom with 3 staff members and 18 children (1:6 teacher: child ratio).

#### **Community Partnerships**

As a Head Start Preschool Agency, we strive to connect with our community and work together to provide services and meet the needs of the children and families. During the 2023-24 program year, here were some of our connections:

#### April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024


We received funding during this fiscal year from the federal government to serve 162 Head Start children from April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024. Federal USDA funds, through the State of Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, provided funding for our child nutrition program providing healthy breakfast, lunch, and snacks. We also received funds through the Mosinee & DC Everest School District 4K agreements with our agency.








# Number of 4k aged students served in our program during the 2023-24 program year:

# Of the Children Enrolled:

- 99% had health insurance
- 93% had a medical home
- 93% were up-to-date with immunizations
- 69% were up-to-date with health services
- · 25% had a dental home
- 96% had a dental exam in the last year
- 6% needed professional dental treatment
- 64% received needed dental treatment
- 21% had behavioral/mental health concerns
- 3% needed mental health referral
- 66% received needed mental health services

# **Staff Professional Development**


Head Start Standards want us to hire teaching assistants who have or are working towards either a Preschool CDA or Associate Degree in Early Childhood (EC) Development. Teachers should have at least an associate degree if not a Bachelor Degree, and our teachers at both Stoddard and KMCzech have either BA (Bachelor degree) or MA (Master degree) with a state of WI teaching licenses as we are 4K Community Partners at those 2 locations. At the end of the program year, we had:

One teacher with MA EC + teaching license Two teachers with BA EC + teaching license Three teachers with BA EC or related field Three teachers with AA EC One Teaching Asst with BA EC
Eight Teaching Asst with AA EC
Four Teaching Asst with Preschool CDA
17 Teaching Asst working towards AA EC or CDA

### **School Readiness Goals**

The Federal *Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act* requires Head Start programs to establish school readiness goals. Using the Creative Curriculum as our curriculum guide and DRDP (Desired Results Developmental Profile) as our assessment tool, MCCDA Head Start has developed goals that align with the Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Outcomes Framework, The Wisconsin Model Early Learning Standards, and the benchmarks set for 4K at both the Mosinee and DC Everest School Districts.

As we strive to focus on the individual needs of the children coming into our programs, we have a strong focus on relationship building and individualizing goals to meet the children where they are at, our teachers continued to make specific mention of the Student Learning Objectives (SLO) indicators in their lesson plans. All children displayed growth and development over the year with the greatest gains in the area of physical development.
